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Adverbs of Time, Place, and Manner- page 116

***An adverb is a word that describes a verb, an adjective, or another adverb.**

The ancient monuments stood **majestically. (verb-manner)**

Some monuments were **relatively famous**. (adjective)

The ancients built **quite skillfully**. (adverb)

***can answer the question when or how often, where, and how**

***An adverb of **time** answers the question **when** or **how often** and usually modifies/describes a verb.**

*Adverbs of time include: again, already, before, early, ever, finally, first, frequently, immediately, later, never, now, often, once, recently, seldom, sometimes, soon, still, today, and usually.

I **already** **knew** that the Temple of Artemis was one of the Wonders of the Ancient World.

*An adverb of **place** answers the question **where** and usually modifies/describes a verb. Adverbs of place include: above, away, back, down, far, forward, here, in, inside, outside, there, and up

When the ancients **looked** **inside**, they saw that the temple was made totally of marble.

*An adverb of **manner** answers the question **how** or in **what manner**. It usually describes a verb.

They usually end in **ly**. Some exceptions are: fast, well, and hard

The Temple of Artemis **was** not **built quickly**.

It **was built well**, however.
